William and Mary	c. 1690-1725
Queen Anne	c. 1725-1750
Chippendale	c. 1750-1780
Federal	c. 1790-1815
Empire	c. 1815-1845
Shaker	c. 1790-1900
Arts & Crafts	c. 1880-1910

French furniture styles include:

Louis XIV	c. 1643-1715
Louis XV	c. 1723-1774
Louis XVI	c. 1774-1793
Directoire	c. 1779-1815
Louis Philippe	c. 1830-1848

English furniture styles include:

Georgian	c. 1714-1812
Regency	c. 1812-1830
Victorian	c. 1837-1901
Edwardian	c. 1901-1910
